

Approximately 2000 vear old pit dwelling remains in the Yavoi Forest are preserved in the ground.



From the Observation Deck you can see the Restored Yayoi Village's stretched below and also Japan Sea can be viewed from the distance



The Mukibanda Remains reveal Yayoi people's spiritual world, how they lived their everyday lives, and their exchanges with neighboring regions and the Asian continent from the 1st Century BC to the early 3rd Century AD.

●Yayoi People's Lifestyle

Earthenware for everyday life





Artifacts used for everyday life such as jars, pots, cups and bowls, were excavated from areas around pit dwellings and moat enclosure. Traces of soot and burnt fragments can be found in pots used for cooking.

Various tools made of stone









Stone knives (for reaping rice stalks), stone axes (for logging), hammer stones, stone plates and grinding stones (for crushing tree nuts), fishing weights, and arrowheads (for hunting) are some of the many stone tools uncovered.

Beads and Bead Making





Green tuff ornaments, jasper tube beads, incomplete artifacts, blue or navy blue colored glass beads and tube beads were uncovered.

● The Spiritual World of Yayoi People

Enshrined Earthenware

Offerings of pots and jars were found at Sentani's Grave No. 5. These earthenware were colored in red, painted with special patterns and placed on earthenware stands.



Painted Earthenware and Carved Lines in Grindstones

Earthenware with paintings of people who performed rituals and geometric patterned arcs, called *Kotaimon*, carved in grindstones were found.





Exchanges with Neighboring Regions



Iron tools that changed everyday life

Over 400 iron artifacts were found in the Mukibanda Remains, mostly instruments used for woodwork or construction tools such as axes (for processing wood), planers (for shaping wood) and knives.

Valuable Bronze Ware

Unearthed broken Chinese mirror finely shaped and polished.



[Excavated Yayoi Settlements]

The Mukibanda Remains stretch over a vast area on the hill ridge where traces of Yayoi people's lifestyle have been left intact. Over 900 buildings and 30 grave mounds have been discovered, which reflect a line from the Chinese historical book, *Gishiwajinden*, "A province dependent on the mountains and islands".

Dounohara District, Western Hills



This large ditch dug around the top of a hill(called a moat enclosure) is 65 meters in diameter and was constructed in the mid-1st century. The trench measures 4 to 5 meters in width and is over 2 meters deep.

Sentani District




In the 2nd century, this burial area is believed to have been the next to be constructed after the burial mounds of the Dounohara District, Eastern Hills. A total of 7 graves have been discovered here including two four-cornered Yayoi burial mounds. Of these 7 graves of Sentani Area, 22 burial pits (burial facilities) for box shaped coffins were discovered in Grave no. 3.

Mukiniiyama District




This district flourished during the late 1st and early 2nd centuries, before the Mukibanda's height of prosperity.


Mukiyama District



This is one of the districts in the central area where most of the relics and remains from the village's golden era (late 2nd Century) were discovered. In addition to Pit Dwellings, circular, roundcorner, and various other shaped buildings have been uncovered.



Dounohara District, Eastern Hills



Here 25 graves constructed over a 100 year period from the late 1st to the early 2nd century have been found. Among these graves are some four-cornered Yayoi burial mounds, in which the four corners of the otherwise rectangular grave protrude sharply outward. These are one example of grave here with shapes very unique to the Japan Sea Coast.

Matsuogashira District



Large-scale pit dwellings, square-shaped building with 24 pillars, and a Chinese mirror were unearthed here. This was perhaps the village of influential person's residential compound. Two square burial mounds constructed in the 3rd Century were also found.

Matsuojo District



Located on the highest point of ruins with an altitude of 150-180 meters.
